### Ordinances & Regulations for the Degree of

### Bachelor of Social work (B.S.W.)

(As per Choice Based Credit System)

### Effective from June – 2016

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-1

A Candidate for the Degree of Bachelor of Social Work must have passed (10+2) examination of the Gujarat Secondary and Higher Secondary education (10+2 pattern) Board or an examination recognized as equivalent thereto and will be required to pass six subsequent semester examinations for the Degree of Bachelor of Social Work. Candidate fulfilling above requirements will be provisionally admitted in the First semester of Bachelor of Social Work Degree Programme.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-2

B.S.W. Degree Programme is of three academic years duration consisting of six semesters, which will be required to be completed within 6 years from the data of his/her first admission in the First semester.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-3

B.S.W. Three Years (six semesters) Degree Programme is a regular fulltime programme and therefore admitted candidate can not join any other course of study without prior permission of the University.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-4

Medium of instruction & examination shall be either <u>Gujarati</u> or <u>English</u> as the case may be and the same will not be changed during the entire Degree programme. Hence, English Paper i.e. Compulsory English and Communication Skill's medium of instruction & examination shall be in English only.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-5

The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) Programme is implemented along with Comprehensive Continuous Assessment (CCA) and minimum attendance as per 0.98 is mandatory for the students. Non-Compliance of this requirement may amount in to rejection of the Concerned Semester.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-6

Students will have to comply with the requirements of 0.182 relating to physical training, athletics, and sports, N.C.C. or N.S.S. etc. as the case may be.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-7

Every candidate admitted in the First semester shall have to appear & pass the examination of "Environmental Protection course" as directed by the Hon. Supreme Court of India & for this the course curriculum shall be the same as it is prescribed by the U.G.C. Such as examination will be conducted by the concerned college without charging any examination fees & certificate to that effect shall have to be appended with the admission form of the University semester-II end examination.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-8

Every candidate admitted to First Semester of any course will have to pass through the Thalassemia Test & Blood Grouping test.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-9

Admission granted by the affiliated college/institution to any student shall be provisional till the Enrolment/Registration/Enlistment is made by the University & in case of admission is granted on the bases of provisional eligibility certificate the conditions & instruction given by the University should be complied within the time Limit fixed by the University or Latest by the beginning of next semester otherwise term kept by the such a student will be forfeited and no any account will be refunded.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-10

Every affiliated College or Institution shall have to take appropriate measure against Ragging & Gender problems in College/Institution. The Word College / Institution include College building, Sports complex, Hostels and such other components which are within the purview of the College.

In case of occurrence of any such incident the violator shall be dealt with very seriously and appropriate stringent action be taken by the Principal of the College observing Principle of natural Justice. The Head of College may appoint a committee to inquire in to the matter which will also observe the principle of natural justice. The committee will submit its report to the head of college who may take further necessary action in the matter.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-11

All admitting authority (Including the College/University Department/ P.G. Centre/Institute or centralized admission committee etc.) will have to strictly observe the provisions of reservation policy of the Govt. / U.G.C. / Rehabilitation Council of India etc. before admission process is under taken the authority will ascertain quota & number of seats available for reserved class candidates and allotted to the eligible candidates. The data based information should also be provided to the University only after conclusion of entire process of admission.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-12

The following Degree courses are within the preview of the Faculty of Arts B.J.M.C., B.L. & I. SC., B.S.W., B.A. (I.D.), B.A. (Home science), the nature & scope of the course is designed to focus on sole & isolated special aspect of study area of the courses. It's Ordinance & Regulations, Teaching and Examination schemes are also provided in the respective syllabus. However, other relevant Ordinances & Regulations of the Faculty of Arts shall also apply to these courses.

#### O. Gen B.S.W.:-13

A Candidate of this or any other University recognized by A.I.U. who has passed the examination of F.Y./S.Y. under Annual pattern of the Faculty of Arts, Commerce, Science, Home Science, Business Management, Performing Arts, or B.R.S. by obtaining at least 40% Marks or equivalent grade, shall be entitled to be admitted in Semester-III or V (as the case may be) provided subject/s passed by the candidate are same or comparable/convertible with CBCS teaching & examination scheme in force at the time of such admission.

When such admission is granted to a candidate all applicable Ordinances & Regulations shall be applied to such a candidate & his/her result at the degree Level University examination will be declared by converting his/her percentage of Marks/Grade which he/she has obtained at the examination of First/Second year as per provisions contained in CBCS introduced by the University.

#### O. B.S.W.:-1

To pass each of the B.S.W. Semester examination, a student must have passed all the subjects in the respective semester. A subject may contain up two heads of passing i.e. theory, field work (including viva-voce) and CCA. To pass an examination a student is required to obtain minimum 'E' Grade of the maximum Grade separately in each head of the passing viz. theory, field work (including (viva-voce) as the case may be.

#### O. B.S.W.:-2

A student who fails at the examination and he has obtained at least 'E' Grade in any head of passing. Provided he/she has passed in the subject shall at his option, be exclude from appearing in that subject to a subsequent examination and will be declared to have passed the whole examination when he/she passed in all the remaining subjects of the examination provided that in the subject in the subject in which he/she appeared on the last occasion he/she must obtain the minimum Grade 'E' in each head as required under the relevant regulation.

#### O. B.S.W.:-3

If a candidate at an University semester end examination fails to obtain minimum marks for passing in particular course (subject) he/she will be require to reappear in that course (subject) without keeping term for that semester. The candidate will have to reappear in the semester end examination by paying fresh examination fee & along with application form such candidate when he/she obtains minimum or more than minimum marks for passing in the course his/her marks of reappearance will be carry forwarded for calculation class/CGPA.

#### O. B.S.W.:-4

To successfully complete a course, candidate will be required to obtain minimum 06 out of 30 mark in CCA (internal) examination as well as 28 out of 70 marks in SEE (External) examination and should have also obtained 40% of marks in aggregate each of the course and necessary credits as prescribed in the syllabus.

#### O.B.S.W.-5

Every students must take to fieldwork, compilation certification from Principal/H.O.D. of the College and working Agency. These two certificates should join in the fieldwork file. If student do not join certificate the student do not eligible for viva – voce.

#### R. B.S.W.:-1

The following are the subject prescribed for the teaching & examination scheme of the B.S.W. fulltime three years Degree Programme.

#### **R.B.S.W.-2**

#### : Admission to higher Semester:

A candidate duly admitted in semester-I shall be eligible for admission up to semester IV, provided he/she gradually appears in internal (CCA) and external (SEE) components of the examination of Semester II, III, & IV. In case of admission to Semester V, the candidate should have cleared all the courses of at least Three Semesters out of four Semesters referred above. A candidate shall be eligible for admission to semester VI<sup>th</sup> without any backlog of semester I to IV and has appeared in the internal (CCA) & external (SEE) examination of Semester V<sup>th</sup>.

The result of semester VIth will be declared only when he/she have cleared all the courses of semester I to V and obtained minimum credits & Percentage of marks in each of the course as prescribed in the syllabus.

#### **R.B.S.W.-3**

Candidate must forward their applications for admission University examination to the registrar on or before the prescribed date with a Certificate of attendance duly signed by the Principal along with the examination fees fixed by the University.

#### **R.B.S.W.-4**

Thirty percent (30%) internal evaluation shall be within the exclusive of the concerned affiliated College which requires purity, transparency accuracy in the evaluation & assessment of students. Benefits of Re- assessment scheme will not be made available to the students in this regards.

#### **R.B.S.W.-5**

The CBCS is not only student centric in the teaching-learning processes but also in their evaluation process. The evaluation process is divided into two parts under the CBCS. The first part-consists of Comprehensive Continuous Assessment (CCA) and the second the two shall be 30:70 in the CBCS, the evaluation process shall follow the norm that the faculty, who teaches the course, shall conduct the Comprehensive Continuous Assessment (CCA), The concerned faculty shall be accountable for transparency and reliability of the entire evaluation of the student in the concerned Course.

#### 5.1 The framework for Comprehensive Continuous Assessment:

Although assessment and evaluation process in CBCS is in continuous mode, for the purpose of finally letting the candidate know his/her progress Periodically, an assessment is divided into four discrete components for reporting the scores to the student as earned by him or her. The details of the Comprehensive Continuous Assessment are summarized in the Table below:

- **5.1.1.** The CAC (College Advisory Council) shall announce policy for CCA for all the courses in the beginning of the semester and the same shall be communicated to the students.
- **5.1.2.** The continuous assessment of first part of the semester shall be completed during the 5<sup>th</sup> week of the semester.
- **5.1.3.** The continuous assessment of second part of the semester shall be completed during the 10<sup>th</sup> week of the semester.
- **5.1.4** The continuous assessment of scores of third part of the Semester will be completed during the 15<sup>th</sup> week of the Semester.
- **5.1.5** In case a student fails to secure 6 out of 30 in the CCA (all three components taken together), he/she shall not be allowed to appear for the Semester end examination. The Principal of the College and the teacher concerned shall arrange or the re-test of such candidates.
- **5.1.6** The teacher concerned shall have the responsibility to make public the CCA marks immediately not later then a week of the examination through the College Notice Board. The Principal shall send the consolidated statement of the course-wise marks of the CCA component to the Controller of Examination a week at least before the Semester-End Examination.

#### 5.2 Semester End Examination (SEE)

During the 18<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> week of the Semester, a semester-end examination shall be conducted.

The duration of the) paper/subject in) Semester-End Examination shall be 3 hours per course. A question paper for Semester-End Examination shall not expect the student to reproduce the answers by memorizing the topics, but it shall rather examine the candidate's creativity, comprehension, problem solving ability, interpretation and awareness capabilities.

## 5.3 Final awarding of the Grades shall be completed latest by 24th week of the semester.

The consolidated marks of all the students in CCA as forwarded by the Principals of the college and the marks secured by the candidates in the SEE shall be accordingly computed for the Grade and the announcement of the result.

#### **Practical Examination:**

Practical examination (Wherever applicable) shall be conducted at end of every semester. The examination shall be conducted as per norms decided by the concerned authority of the University. The Controller of Examination of the University shall announce policy for the practical examination in advance and it shall be made known to the students also in advance. There shall be no internal assessment test for practical/laboratory work.

#### **Project/Dissertation work:**

The Project Work and the Supervisor shall be assigned to the student by the concerned college well in advance.

- 5.4 Rules and the Procedure for granting Re-admission to the student shall be as under,
- 5.4.1 Who had no put in the required attendance in a course in the concern Programme of a semester and thus detained, or
- 5.4.2 Who had not cleared the required number of Courses and thus detained; or
- 5.4.3 Who had not, after completing a semester continued the studies in the next immediate semester on Personal/ health grounds but desired to continue his/her studies after a short break; such a student shall be eligible to rejoin the Programme from where he/she

had left it subject to clause 5.4.5 & 5.4.6 A student who had put in not less than 40% of attendance in a semester and not registered for the examination shall be considered for the re-admission in the same semester.

- 5.4.4 A student who had put in not less than 40% of attendance in a semester and not registered for the examination shall be considered for the re-admission in the same semester.
- 5.4.5 The student who after completing the first two semesters Programme, if opts out of the Programme, then he or she shall be eligible to rejoin the Programme, subject to the time period elapsed has not exceeded two years.
- 5.4.6 Such readmissions shall be granted by the Principal of the concerted college directly, subject to the fulfillment of the following conditions:
  - a) The concerned teachers have granted the attendance of the Course in each semester.
  - b) The student shall complete the Programme within 6 years from the year of the original admission.
  - c) No readmission shall be granted after the first four weeks of the semester in which he/she is seeking admission.
- 5.4.7 Readmission shall not be applicable to the Programme in which admission is granted by a Central Admission Committee/ college it self.
- 5.4.8 The Six-semester (three year) Programme shall be completed by a student within 6 years from the date of enrolment.

Note: The provisional grade card will be issued at the end of every semester indicating the course completed successfully. Upon successfully completion of Bachelor Degree Program a final grade card, which shall consists of grades of all courses will be issued by controller of Examinations of the University.

#### 5.5 PROCEDURE FOR AWARDING THE GRADES

5.5.1 The computation for the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and cumulative grade point average (CGPA) shall be as follows: The raw marks scored by the student (CCA+SEE) shall be indicated as M.

The 'Grade Point' and the grade letter that shall be awarded to the student on the bases of the range in which M is found is given in the following Table:
